From the Chair

My congratulations to the members of the La Trobe's Cottage Management Team.

While my role is a small one, I have been impressed to see how the new team is working so well together in the interests of the Cottage. I have been aware, too, of just how much work has been involved, and the many hours they all put in. Neville has taken the lead with liaising with the National Trust. At the Property Managers meeting, he represented the Cottage to the senior team at Tasma Terrace, and he continues to communicate with them and coordinate the affairs of the Management Team. Alexis has done a great job with her 'Housekeeping' portfolio, having, with the support of National Trust Curator Katie Potter, completed a Spring Clean of the Cottage, and rationalised the storage of goods and documents around the Cottage and into the Shed. Colin, Sandi, Helen A and Helen B continue to ensure the interests of the Cottage are forefront in each of their respective roles.

Following concern about the Government House tours that Judge Howard, the Governor's husband, has been providing for U3A groups at no charge, and the marketing of these by the Office of the Governor, John Drury, Manager of the La Trobe Society, and I had a meeting with NTAV Chair Simon Ambrose on 17 October. These tours are likely to have an impact on the combined Government House/La Trobe's Cottage tours booked through the National Trust, thus reducing the income generated by these tours for La Trobe's Cottage. I am hoping that the outcome of this meeting may be to initiate discussions with the Office of the Governor with a view to a resolution of this matter, and to improve the National Trust marketing of the combined tours.

In general, the cottage continues to be in a good state of maintenance.

Following an inspection by the NT contractor regarding the state of the electrics within the building it has been decided that no immediate action is required. Other than the absence of illuminated exit signs which prevent us from using the cottage after dark we are compliant and safe.

A quotation for repainting the cottage has been reviewed and it was decided not to take any action. In general, the paintwork is still in acceptable condition and the structure will not deteriorate if painting is postponed for 12 to 24 months.

Consideration is currently being given to removing the internal air conditioning units, which have not been operating for many years. Quotations for replacing the inoperative system (and even removing the external units) are deemed beyond the Cottage's current budget.

Tasks recently completed include: realigning the bolt on the double garden entry gate; fitting wheels to the "A" frame sign; making a sign asking visitors not to enter the Cottage without first visiting reception; and mounting a key box in the volunteers' kitchen.

26th January 2018, 1-4pm. Family Day at La Trobe's Cottage

Next Australia Day is being promoted by the National Trust as a Family Day, with the Cottage and grounds being open between 1pm and 4pm. The \$2 entry fee will include a fairly brief and focussed guided tour of the Cottage and the servants block. A Victorian experience will be provided for visitors, with several volunteers dressed in period costumes, plus old-fashioned games for the children including quoits and croquet. There will also be:
