Hello Volunteers,

We hope you are seeing through this difficult time, and that you and your family have kept well throughout. It is good to see that numbers are decreasing, but I fear re-opening of the Cottage is still well into the future.

During the Covid-19 shutdown, the National Trust is endeavouring to keep up a presence through social media, and last week it was the turn of the Cottage. Their Instagram post can be viewed via this link https://www.instagram.com/p/CE3Jew3jz6S/?igshid=1xr6777lpoovv

You should have all received an email last week from Emily Howells, National Trust People and Culture Manager, saying it is anticipated that National Trust gardens may re-open in late October, with programs inside buildings opening from late November. However, any decision about the re-opening of the Cottage may still be some way off.

I'm glad to tell you that the garden is being looked after. The gardens team from Serco have been working – they have completed weeding, edging and final mulching using what Sam from Serco tells me is 'a fine grade product from Bark King called 'Feeder' mulch'. And the garden really is looking very nice – the 'Elm Bed' is full of pretty flowers, and the cliveas and echium are at their best.





Our thoughts have turned, like many other institutions, to a virtual tour of the Cottage which could be offered. We have had, since 2015, a modest virtual tour: click on https://barneymeyer.com/LaTrobeCottage. This was produced by the National Trust in association Dr Jo Clyne of Education & Consultancy Services, History Teachers' Association of Victoria. If you click on the rooms on the menu on the left, and mouse over and click on items of furniture, or different areas in a room during this video, an information window pops up about, e.g. at the front door, 'Lonsdale' and 'portable cottage'; in the bedroom, 'Sophie La Trobe' and 'La Trobe Medicine Chest'; in the dining room, 'La Trobe's father', and 'La Trobe's grandfather', etc. You need to 'move' around the room, as on Streetview, to get to all the links. These links don't always work, and we are investigating now to see if anything can be done to update this, and perhaps increase the number of items with a link. We'll also need to make a few corrections, and we wondered if you'd like to help us 'Spot the Mistakes'. I have found quite a few, including items and typos in the pop-ups, and in the audio. Can you find more? And would you like to suggest any new links, and any other improvements?

The number of societies offering online talks seems to keep increasing. The Friends of the Royal Botanic Gardens have been offering interesting talks for some time, and you may like to register for one or two, https://www.rbgfriendsmelbourne.org/whats-on/ For FRBG and Garden History Society members the fee is \$5,

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for others it's \$10. The talks on the Lakes and Islands of the Botanic Gardens (22 October) and the Shrine Gardens (14 November) may give us a better understanding of areas near the Cottage.

We hope you all keep well, and that we are soon able to enjoy some greater freedoms.

Hello Volunteers,

We hope you are all keeping well, if perhaps suffering from 'COVID-Fatigue'!

I wanted to let you know that the Australian Garden History Society have asked me to give a presentation about La Trobe and his garden at Jolimont. This will take place on Zoom on 29 October at 6pm. It will be based around the material I have presented before, using the drawings of Edward La Trobe Bateman but in this presentation I will be giving more details about how the plants in today's Cottage Garden represent the plants that La Trobe himself collected or were named after him. We'll look at plants on the lists sent to La Trobe in 1844 by Ronald Gunn in Van Diemen's Land and by the Sydney Botanic Garden and compare the old varieties with those available today. I'm providing lots of pictures of the plants in today's garden and talking about why they are there! Non-members of the AGHS are welcome to register, but I'm afraid it will cost \$10,
