We have had some interesting visitors during the past month.

On 7 February we were honoured by an informal visit by representatives of the Swiss Delegation in Australia. They were the Deputy Head of Mission, Fabian Grass, the Science, Technology and Education Advisor, Sébastien Monnet, and the Honorary Consul in Melbourne, Manuela Erb. M. Grass had visited the Jolimont precinct and saw the plaque erected by Public Record Office Victoria at the orginal site of the Cottage. Being 'a big fan of Sophie La Trobe' he found our contact details on the FOLTC webpage and sent an email asking whether it might be possible, at very short notice, to visit. Helen Armstrong was able to respond to this request, providing an informative tour of the Cottage. The visitors were interested in Swiss-born Sophie La Trobe's life in early Melbourne, and they are keen to foster relations with the Cottage and build on the 'Sophie connection'. An Australian embassy has been recently re-established in Berne.

At a Sunday opening on 19 February Neville Jarvis had the pleasure of welcoming four descendants of an early house servant at *Jolimont*, Maria Watson, who emigrated from London and arrived with the La Trobes from Sydney in 1839. She and her sister Esther both worked at *Jolimont* for a year until they married, Maria moving to Geelong and Esther accompanying her husband back to Ireland. The visitors appreciated seeing the cottage and hearing about 1840s Melbourne. A conversation with Neville after this visit has prompted Helen Armstrong to compile a list of La Trobe's servants and this will be forwarded to our volunteers.

December, we discussed some initiatives to promote the Cottage, one of which to make contact with the City of Melbourne Tourism volunteers – the 'red coats' who are available in the CBD to answer questions and advise visitors to Melbourne. Following this, a group of seventeen City of Melbourne volunteers undertook a 'Familiarisation Tour' of the Cottage on Tuesday 28 February. They reported that they enjoyed the tour and the information provided. Several didn't know the Cottage was there, and most were surprised at the genuine artefacts and furniture held there. We hope their visit may cause them to consider suggesting that tourists visit La Trobe's Cottage.

Another initiative was to send information to Garden Clubs about the garden tours we offer. The Cottage garden is starting to look autumnal now, and a busy Working Bee with eleven participants took place on Tuesday 21 February. Some bigger shrubs were pruned hard back, and the beds around the Cottage were weeded and tidied. We thank all those that took part.

We are very pleased to note that the *Maurandya barclayana* (Mrs Perry's creeper) grown from the seed taken from the specimen on the front porch lattice that mysteriously died in September 2021 (see FOLTC Newsletter 38 <u>https://www.foltc.latrobesociety.org.au/documents/FOLTCNewsletter38.pdf</u>) is doing well, and even has a few flowers. Mrs Perry would be pleased!

Work to replace rotting timbers on the Servants' Block, to be funded by the Friends of La Trobe's Cottage, has been carried out. There is still more work to be done on some rotting window frames and Alyce, National Trust Project Manager, has placed this on the maintenance list.
